Citizens around state have say in redistricting this week

All this week, the South Carolina Senate Redistricting Subcommittee will hear from citizens on efforts to redraw state lines for a new congressional district the state gained for 2012.

Senate President Pro Tem Glenn McConnell is the chair of the subcommittee and encourages residents to be at the hearings when the panel comes to their area. Each of the 10 meetings will focus on the specific district the counties represented are in. The senators will be in Conway on Monday. On Tuesday, the hearing will be in Columbia, Wednesday in Florence, and Thursday in Charleston.

McConnell says every 10 years they are required by federal law to redraw legislative and congressional districts. This year, they are looking at adding a seventh congressional seat. But first, the subcommittee wants to hear from the public.

Meanwhile, the South Carolina House will also be holding similar hearings across the state over the next two weeks. Rep. Alan Clemmons (R-Horry) is chair of the

subcommittee spearheading the effort. Clemmons said he was disappointed by low turnout at the panel's first meeting in Columbia last week. Only five people testified.

Clemmons is concerned that a lack of public input may cause legislators to split communities and towns that have natural ties.

It's very important that we have this input. Without it, we have to make guesses... with it, we don't have to guess. We'll have information to back us up.

He also urged residents to tell the panel as much as possible about each area, to help legislators make informed decisions. Although Clemmons had not been elected yet during the 2001 redistricting, he said officials made some mistakes due to a lack of input.

Everybody steps back and scratches their head and says, "Why is it that the people we have always been with in the past are now separated from us?" This is the time to prevent that from happening.

Redistricting: Let's not wait another 10 years

In the famous classic film "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington," Jimmy Stewart plays Sen. Jefferson Stewart, a small town scoutmaster that political heavyweights believe will be the perfect dupe to be controlled by the state's senior senator.

Boy, were they ever wrong.

In a somewhat similar spirit, a large, impressive contingent of Colletonians attended last Monday's state Senate Redistricting Committee hearing in Beaufort to let the senators know we won't be "duped" again.

Equal representation for Colleton County means the status quo cannot continue. While no one questions the individual integrity of the members of our current Legislative Delegation, only one of the members—its chairman Rep. Ken Hodges—actually claims a primary residence in the county.

Two of the three senators on the delegation represent constituents in five counties because of the way the current boundaries

meander from the previous redistricting. The other senator has constituents in four counties.

When Colleton is only a one-fourth or one-fifth slice of a senator's area of representation, how can that ever bode well when issues of our concern need state Legislative attention?

There's also the chance this time around that Colleton could actually gain a full seat in the state House of Representatives because of our growing population.

But it's going to take continued strong lobbying efforts by Colletonians, who were well represented Monday. Our hats are off to those who made our case for a better deal this time. The rest of us should follow their example. Let's not be duped again. Colleton County deserves better, and our future depends on it.

End slice-and-dice politics

Redistricting must put Colleton's house together

We're fortunate to have a group at work trying to convince the S.C. General Assembly that our community cannot truly be a community as long as it remains politically sliced up into three House Districts and three Senate districts.

Monday night, Colleton County Council member Joe Flowers, Walterboro Mayor Bill Young, Walterboro City Councilman Charles Lucas and local attorney and city council candidate Bobby Bonds, were in Beaufort, where they appeared before the S.C. Senate's Redistricting Subcommittee. That subcommittee is in the early stages of its post-census redistricting work.

For the past 20 years, no legal resident of our county has occupied a seat in either chamber of the General Assembly, and as long as our House and Senate districts remain configured as they are, none ever will. Our community voice can never be expressed through our votes as long as it is diluted by means of the slice-and-dice operation that occurred 20 years ago. We are nothing less than victims of the old divide-and-

conquer maneuver. Our community's interests cannot be represented in Columbia as long as we're chopped up and the resulting pieces are patched onto parts of other counties whose interests are unconnected with or even possibly counter to our own.

There are more upcoming Senate and House subcommittee redistricting public hearings over the next week, and we hope that representatives from Colleton County and Walterboro will continue to pound their message into the heads of senators and House members. Our citizens need to join the effort by getting their own messages directly to every elected state official involved.
