Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen:

My name is Charlie Luquire. Thank you for the opportunity to make comment. I live in Georgetown County and my comments will be primarily about House District 108, but will also touch on the new Congressional District that will be established. My comment is on my own behalf and perhaps some of my friends and neighbors who share similar views.

House District 108 includes, as you know, the eastern part of Georgetown County, and extends into Charleston County. We have many friends and have enjoyed a good relationship with the Charleston portion of the current district. On the other hand, our coastal Georgetown community - really all of Georgetown County - also has ties to southern Horry County. Therefore, with redistricting and with continued growth in our area of Georgetown County, our goal is to keep our House seat centered in the coastal portion of Georgetown County.

Additionally, with regard to a new Congressional District, there are compelling reasons for having the center of gravity of that new Congressional district in the northeastern corner of South Carolina, with a configuration similar to an earlier district of which Georgetown County was a part. It makes sense to us that South Carolina House District 108 be included in such a new 7th Congressional District. We anticipate that the counties of Horry, Georgetown, Williamsburg, Florence, Darlington, Marion, Marlboro, Chesterfield, and Dillon will be included as parts of the expected new District 7.

The South Carolina Senate and House have a number of principles that have been put forth to guide redistricting; they include:

- Preserving the core of prior alignments
- Avoiding contests between incumbents
- Recognizing communities of interest
- Maintaining integrity of political alignments

I believe that having the center of gravity of House Seat 108 in coastal Georgetown County and included in a future 7th Congressional District fulfills those principles.
